The Glass Family

The first members of the Glass family came to South Carolina from the town of Blackwater in Lee County, Virginia. They first settled in Clifton around 1917 but moved to Pacolet Mills a short time later around 1920. Granville Duff Glass and his wife Parolee Louisa Osborne moved into a house at what was then 9 Cleveland St. Pacolet Mills. His great, great granddaughter, Brooke Lundeen now lives in the same house. Granville Glass was a farmer before coming to SC. In the 1930 census, taken months before his passing, he was listed as an oiler at the Pacolet Cotton Mill.

Granville and his wife Parolee had nine children. However, one died before they moved to Pacolet. They did what many other families had done before and after them. They moved to the South Carolina Upcountry to find work and a better life in the textile mills. The following gives more information about the members of the family:

More General Family Information

John Glass moved to Gramling after getting married and worked as a Bank Cashier as listed in the 1930 Census. In the 1940 census, he is a listed as a Book Keeper at a cotton mill, but not sure which one.

Mary Glass Robinette and Emmett were already divorced by the time of the 1940 census. On that she is listed as a Cloth Inspector at Pacolet Mills. She worked at the Mill until she retired.

In both the 1930 and 1940 census, Bonnie Glass was a Spinner at the Pacolet Mills


In the 1930 census, Fred Glass worked at Pacolet Mills. In 1940 census he still worked at Pacolet Mills and was listed as a Machine operator.

In the 1940 census, both Addie Glass Wells and Cora Glass Brown were Frame Spinners in the Pacolet Mill.

Amos Glass, in the1940 census, is listed as both a Spooler and as a Machine operator at Pacolet Mills.

The Glass family made an important contribution to the Pacolet Mills community. Several of Granville and Parolee's children married the children of other Pacolet area residents and raised their children in Pacolet Mills. Many of their descendants still live in the community.

One of the children in particular, Jesse Glass, had a big influence on the town. At one time, Jesse was the Pacolet Mills Postmaster. 


