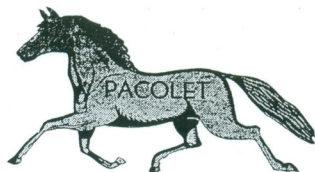

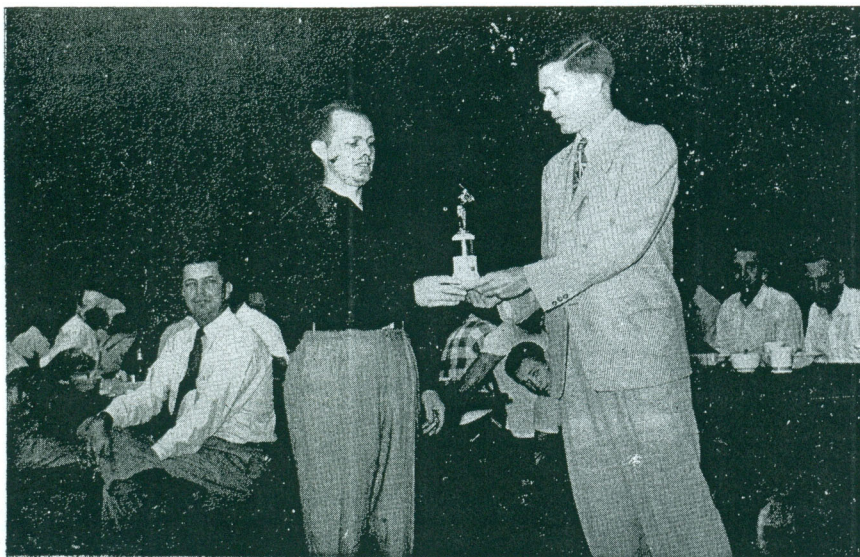

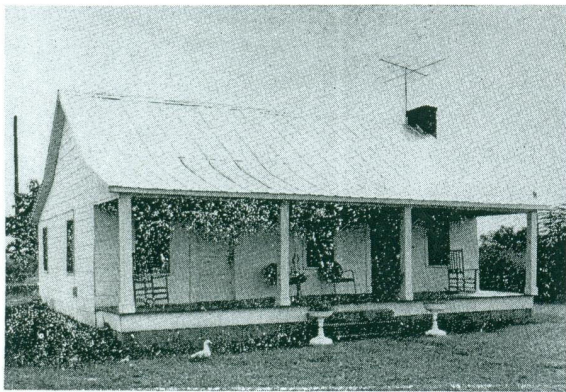
### PARTY GIVEN MISS HATTIE NICHOLSON

**ALLISON HOME—**

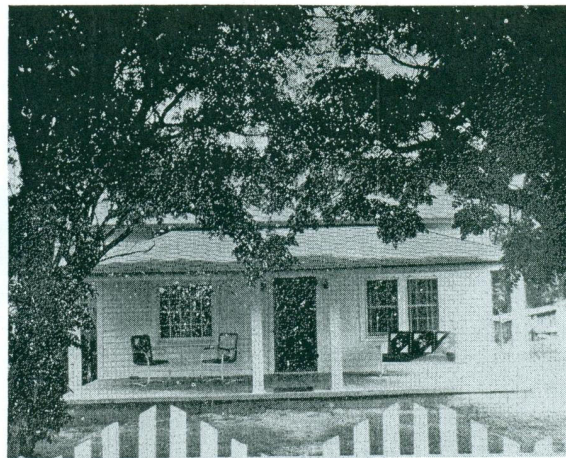

There are two beautifully furnished bedrooms and a lovely modern bathroom and these rooms together with the dining room constitute the old part of the house. The kitchen is the one room that the Allisons decided to do just as they wanted and so in planning it they "turned themselves loose." It was built on, and a concrete porch was screened in at the side. The kitchen floor has a red inlaid linoleum

wide arch. There is another bedroom back of the lounge which is entered by going down three steps. It's very attractive and since none of the family walk in their sleep, it should be fine.

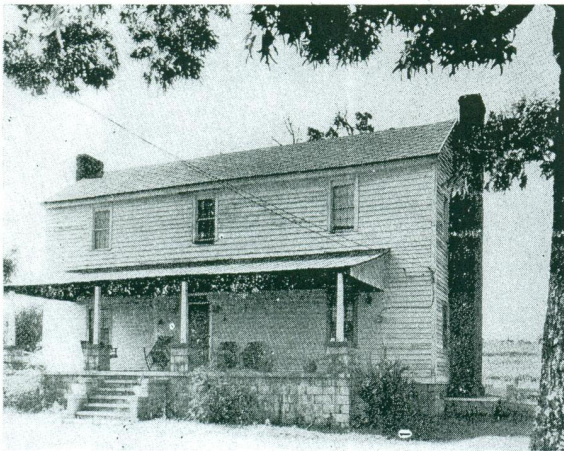

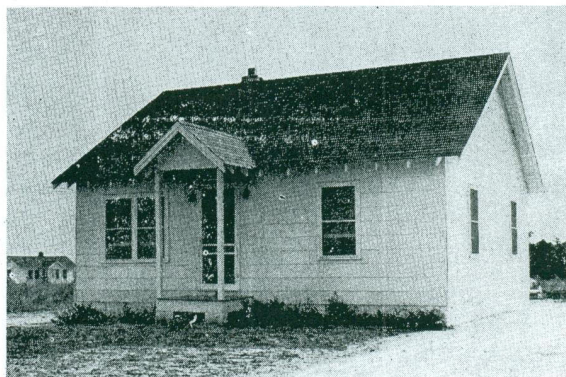
cool home in the summer.

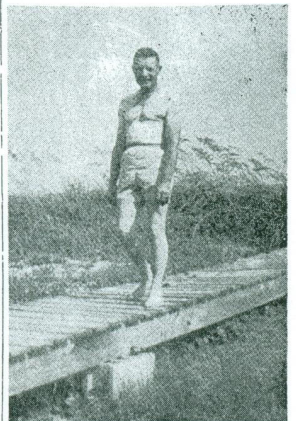

# Winner Of Little State League Trophies Activities, News Of Month From Pacolet Mills Baptist Church

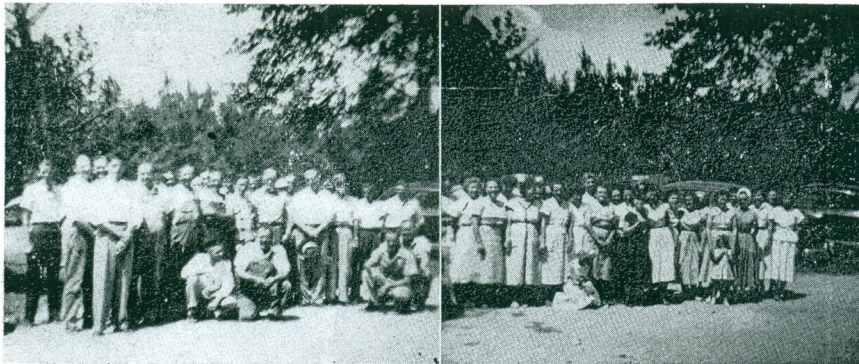

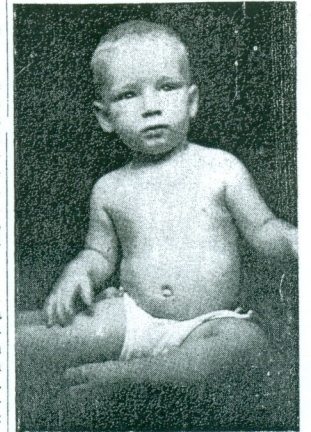
"The colored Sunday School paid my way to and from Columbia.
