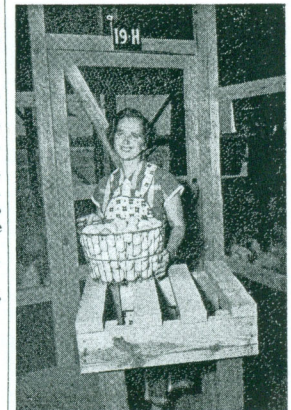
Sgt. Fallaw had charge of the program on safety. He presented the subject in a most interesting way, with demonstrations and safety yells.

While she works in Spartanburg she lives at home and is very active in her church and community and we have reason to take great pride in her and her work.

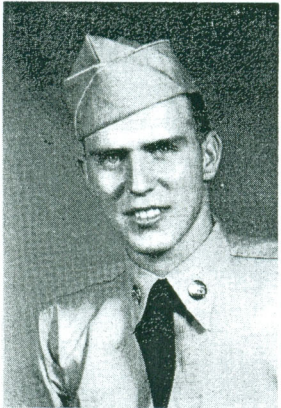
SURPRISE BIRTHDAY DINNER

Pvt. Jarnigan is shown at right with the armed forces in Korea, with one of his Engineer buddies.



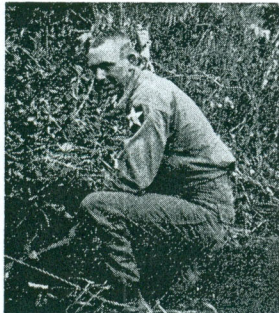

Pacolet School News

The Pacolet Public Schools opened for the 1952-53 school year August 28 with a nice increase in enrollment. The increase was greater than expected. The greatest increase was in the Pacolet Mills - Pacolet area. The enrollment on September 15, 1952 for this area was 125 greater than on the same date in 1951. The increase in enrollment in this area created a housing problem for the pupils. It was necessary to make some re-assignment of pupils to schools in the district. A greater increase in enrollment is expected as the year progresses.

New courses added to the High School curriculum include Driver Training, Band, and Physics. McArthur Wood Chevrolet Co. of Gaffney, is providing the car for the Driver Training. We are most grateful to the firm for its splendid cooperation in making the car available.

The new members on the various faculties are: Pacolet Mills — Mrs. Miriam Steadman, Mrs. Addie Holland, and Mrs. Grace Reeves. Glendale — Mrs. Grace Champion, Mrs. H. T. Blackwell. Pacolet High — Miss Mildred Pettit of Gaffney, and Miss Hazel Henrickson of Route 4, Pacolet. Mrs. Ruby Kirby has returned to the faculty.

During the summer the following improvements and additions were made. The interior of the old building at Pacolet Station was completely renovated. One hundred fifty new desks were purchased to replace old ones and to provide for the increase in enrollment. An electric Ditto Machine was purchased for this area. The

old boiler in this building has been replaced with a much larger one. Steam heat is now available for the gymnasium. At Pacolet Mills the cafeteria floor has been retiled and the walls repainted. Also, the hallways in the old building have been renovated. The exterior of the frame building has been repainted and repaired. At Glendale a stoker has been added to the heating system, and a hot water heater is in the process of being installed.

No improvements have been made on the present colored schools. This is due to the fact that a new building is planned for these boys and girls. A well has been dug on the property where the new colored school is to be placed. The Architect's plans have been approved and bids for construction will be called for in the near future.

The faculties of the several schools are most optimistic over the prospects for achievement for the year. However, some of the classes have a much too large enrollment. We hope to find some solution to this condition.

We invite the parents and friends of the schools to come and visit with us at anytime you wish. We are grateful for the fine cooperation the community has shown in the past. We sincerely hope that this good relationship will continue.

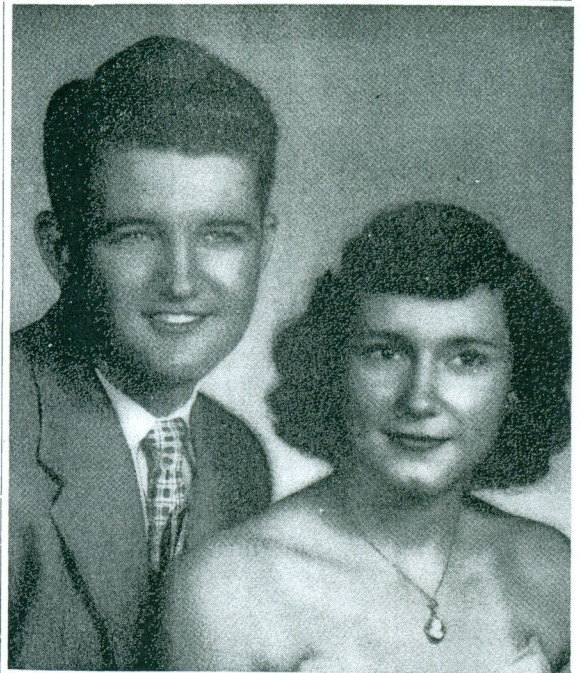
Fred and Elizabeth were married in Canada, and they have been home about two weeks. Fred has his discharge from the army and they have not decided where their home will be.

Devore and June were married April 25, 1951, but decided to wait until after June finished Spartanburg Junior College in 1952 to announce their marriage and take a honeymoon.

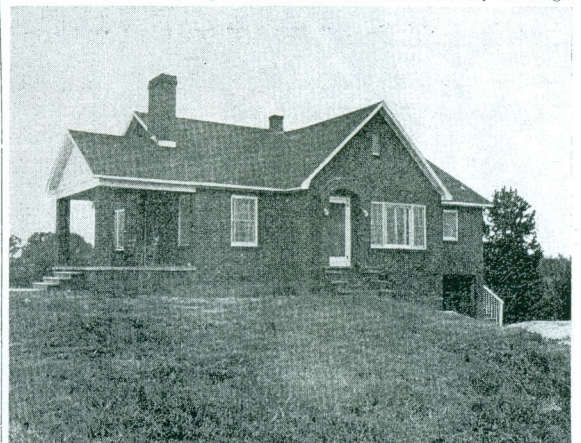

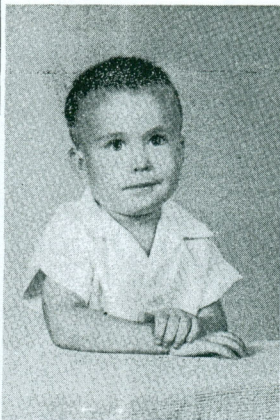
