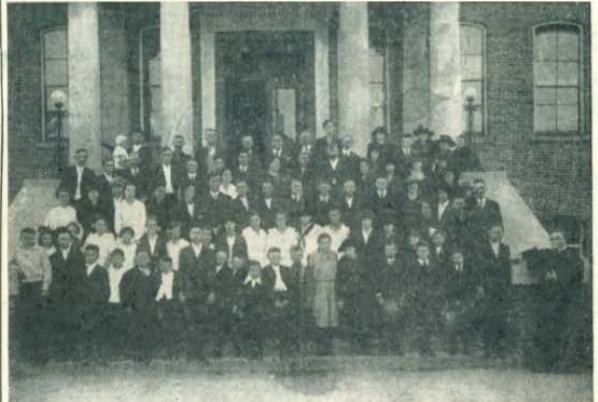

Sunday School enrollment 405 with average attendance of 250. The men's Bible class had an enrollment of 30, with an average of 20 present. The Woman's Missionary Union had an enrollment of 23 members. Two B.Y.P.U. societies, Junior and Senior. The Sunbeams — 35, average attendance of 30. Church services were held in the Y.M.C.A. building during the building of the now present Pacolet Mills Baptist Church.

Recent Revival at Montgomery Memorial Church

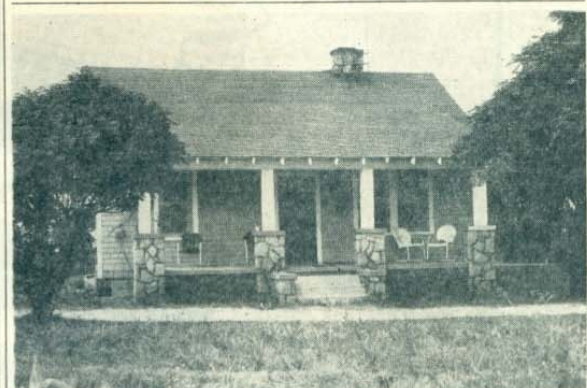
Montgomery Memorial Church recently enjoyed a series of Revival Services under the leadership of Rev. E. P. Bell of Buffalo, S. C.

PACOLET HIGH NEWS

The 1954-55 school has opened and is now well under way.

Assistant Superintendent V. M. Epting announces that new grammar schools are under construction at Pacolet and Glendale. The new Pacolet school is costing \$120,000 and will be across the highway from the present school. The Glendale school is being constructed on a site donated by Glendale Mills and is costing \$110,000. Both will be constructed on the very latest school design.

Pacolet's new grammar school will feature a cafeterium with folding stages, principal's office, clinics, toilet facilities and storage space. Both schools will be one-story, of similar design. They will be greystone brick with blue stone trimmings in front.

Heat will be through coal-type furnaces with the lighting to be of the latest design. Plenty of natural light will be supplied through the use of glass bricks over windows. The H. T. Eargle Construction Co. has contracted both jobs.
