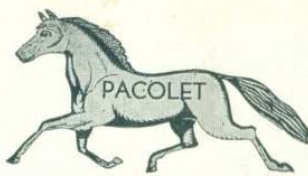

BAPTIST, METHODIST

NO CONFLICT BETWEEN THESE TWO MINISTERS

PACOLET—Baptist and Methodist congregations in this community get their sermons from the same study.

Their pastors are partners.

This example of closeknit ministerial cooperation has been evident in the community for quite a while.

The pastors are the Rev. James W. Crocker, Baptist, and the Rev. W. S. Pettus, Methodist.

Mr. Crocker and Mr. Pettus live side by side.

They share the same driveway.

Their studies are housed under the same roof in a small frame building adjacent to their homes.

Frequently they discuss church and community matters of mutual interest.

Mr. Crocker is pastor of Pacolet Mills Baptist Church.

Mr. Pettus is pastor of Pacolet Mills Montgomery Memorial Methodist Church.

In point of pastoral services, Mr. Pettus is dean. He has been in the ministerial field for 35 years.

This close association for the two ministers is soon to split up.

Mr. Crocker has accepted a call as pastor of Boiling Springs Baptist Church to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of the Rev. Dudley Pomeroy.

Mr. Crocker has been pastor of the Pacolet Mills Church for two and a half years. He was ordained in 1945 and held his first pastorate at York Baptist Church. After two years, he accepted a call to the Erlanger Baptist Church in

Lexington, N. C. where he stayed for four years.

He is a graduate of the North Greenville Junior College, Furman University and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.

Mr. Crocker is a native of Union. He is married to the former Miss Vera Morris, also a native of Union. They have a son, Jimmie, 5.

Mr. Crocker will report for his new post at Boiling Springs, April 10th.

Mr. Pettus was licensed to preach Oct. 10, 1921, and admitted to the Upper S. C. Conference at Gaffney, Nov. 9, 1922.

Mr. Pettus married the former Miss Nannie Lee Alderson at Fort Mills in 1917. They have a daughter, Mary Ruth, who is now the wife of Dr. Howard J. McLhane of Temple, Tex.

Mr. Pettus was educated at Clemson College and at Emory University where he took special courses.
