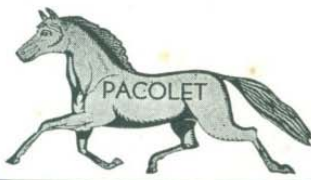

This Issue of The Neigh Is Dedicated to Dr. R. D. Hill

Through the years Dr. Hill has served the people of Pacolet Mills and surrounding communities faithfully and well, as physician counselor and friend.

When he came to Pacolet Mills on February 1, 1927, he opened his office and clinic in what is now the Personnel Office. At that time he did tonsil and other operations in his clinic in addition to the regular examination and office treatments. The patients would be kept overnight for observation and sent home the next day following the operation.

Some time later he moved his office into the building that once was the community nursery and is now an apartment house. There he enlarged his clinic and had a small hospital, where patients were admitted and treated for days at the time when necessary. A great many of the young people in our community were born there.

Several years ago he moved to

his present location. Due to the fact that it was easy to get to the hospital in Spartanburg he no longer needed to keep patients overnight or give them hospital care.

For most of the youngsters and people of all ages, Dr. Hill is the one and only doctor when sickness comes. He delivered most of the younger people, treated them through chicken pox, mumps, measles and colds and he has been so much more to all of us than just our family physician. He gives to his patients advice in their troubles and sympathy in their sorrows, as well as medical care for their sick bodies.

Dr. Hill is married to the former Miss Beatrice Dolan. Their children are Mary Emma Hill Walters of Cheraw and Dennis Hill of Asheville.

The grandchildren are George, Jr., Emma Dennis and Bea Dolan Walters, Cheraw S. C., and Lisa Hill, Asheville.

New Fire Truck Purchased

Pacolet Mills has bought a new 1957 model fire truck, which is to be delivered the latter part of April. It has the latest type of fire fighting equipment that is available at the present time. The new truck will tend to serve this area more efficiently since it is of larger capacity in every respect.

Many people will benefit from this purchase in the future, since the problem of insurance will eventually confront every property owner to a greater extent.

Plans are being made now for a new fire station to house the new equipment. This station, when completed, will house the new truck as well as the old one which is being used at this time. Pacolet Manufacturing Company has donated to Pacolet Mills their fire fighting equipment plus their truck. They also have donated the ground for the new fire station. Their generosity is greatly appreciated. Many thanks to them. With this continuing cooperation both areas will greatly benefit.

A re-organization meeting was held March 12, 1957 at the Pacolet Mills Town Hall with Olin Hodge, who has been appointed Fire Chief

by the city council, in charge. Jennings Banks was elected Assistant Fire Chief, and Bill Phillips and Willie Goforth were elected Captains. Dallas Parker was elected Secretary and Treasurer.

The following plans were made for the future: Fire drills to be held on Tuesday afternoons at 4:30 p.m. at the present station, with one exception which is to hold a fire drill the last Tuesday in the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. At this meeting discussions will be held on the handling of the equipment and the elimination of fire hazards.

Men who enrolled for Volunteer Fire Service besides the above listed officers are: Edward Ellison, Wm. D. Trent, Guy Lovings, David Smith, Ralph Lovings, J. W. McGraw, and Jack Lovings.

All men over 18 years of age who would like to serve their community by joining this worthy group, should contact one of the members for more information. Many are needed at present to form an efficient Department, and we think you will find it very interesting.

On March 4-8 of this year, we

had ten men of our Department to attend a school for volunteer Fire Departments of this area. The school was held in the fire station at Pacolet, and was conducted by Mr. H. B. Wells, who is an instructor for the South Carolina State Fireman's Association in conjunction with the State Department of Education. We are anticipating Mr. Well's return to this area possibly in May. We heartily recommend this school to anyone who can possibly attend, as it will make us more fire conscience and consequently make Pacolet Mills a safer place in which to live. Present plans are to obtain this instructor for a morning and an evening class so that a volunteer force can be obtained for men who work on the second shift. When this is accomplished, we believe every citizen of our area will be proud of their Fire Department.

Don't regard this as folly and say, "Let John do it." Come on out, fellows, and assume your responsibility to your home and your town! Let's pull together and not apart, and we will have a town to be proud of.

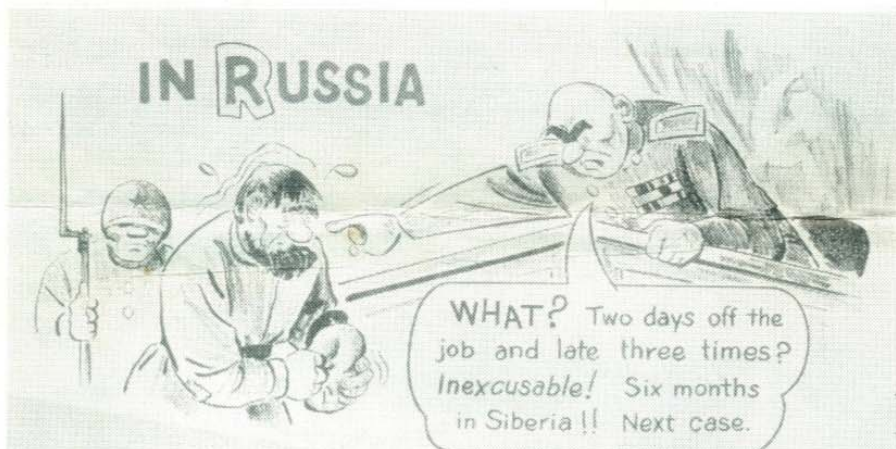
PETTY - KIRBY

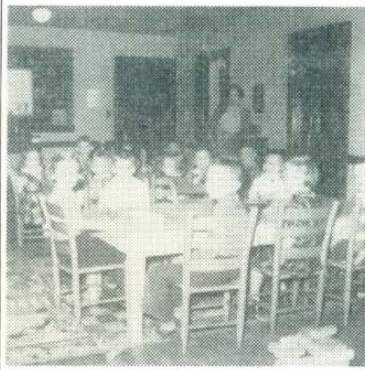

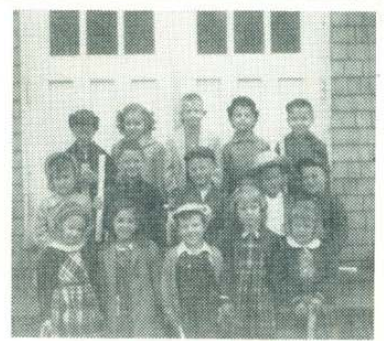

THE KINDERGARTEN

On October 22, 1956, a long awaited dream became a reality with the opening of a Kindergarten sponsored by the Pacolet Mills Baptist Church and under the direction of Mrs. P. B. Bobo with Mrs. Leroy Pace as her assistant. The annex to the church became the center of activity for sixteen happy children five days a week.

Kindergarten provides many and varied experiences for the children, all playing a vital part in a child's development.

Our normal daily schedule consists of painting, either by brush

or spatter; working with clay, puzzles, beads, blocks, housekeeping equipment; care of pets; planting and caring for plants; rhythms; lunch; rest; outdoor games; books; and Bible stories and prayer.

Early in the fall the children spent several days gathering mosses, woods plants, dried pods, grasses, rocks and berries for making terrariums and dried arrangements. An outdoor picnic was enjoyed on these occasions.

One day we visited the Spartanburg First Baptist Church Kindergarten, Kennedy Library for the

Story Hour, and Cleveland Park to see the animals in the zoo. On another day we went for a walk to Arthur's Store to purchase equipment for our room. On the way we saw the United States Flag being raised, and because of that experience we have learned to appreciate and value our flag.

During the Christmas season the children entertained their parents with a Christmas program and party. Gifts were made by them and presented to their parents on this occasion.

During the Spring months we are planning to visit the Fire De-

partment, Airport, and Mr. White's Diesel Engine. Our final outing will be a trip to Greenville on the train and a picnic in the park. Cars will be there to bring us back home.

Every child in Kindergarten will have a Birthday Party during the year. These are very simple but happy experiences for the entire group. Each child receives a small birthday gift from Kindergarten.

Kindergarten will close for this year on May 31, 1957. Plans are underway for continuing it next school year.
